
Resource for Former Family Carers Reaches Across Ireland

Since the launch in March of our new publication *The Way Ahead* – a resource to support former family carers – we have been inundated with requests from across Ireland for hard copies.

Just under 2,000 copies have been distributed to individuals and organisations in every county in Ireland. Copies have been sent to Citizens Information Centres and to Intreo Centres, as well as to our member organisations. Several hundred copies have been given to Family Carers Ireland, as they begin the roll out of their Plan C Programme for former family carers. Enquires about the resource have been made from as far away as Australia.

There have been over 3,000 direct downloads of the resource and we are now seeking funds to get more hard copies printed and distributed across Ireland.

Annie McGuinness took part in a number of radio interviews since the launch, promoting the booklet and discussing life as a former family carer.

News Meeting with Mental Health Ireland



Our recent meetings with leaders of our membership organisations serve to keep us aware of the issues they face in their support of families.

In the area of mental health, we are particularly aware of the sensitivities around the use of terminology, noting the extensive use of the term 'supporter' as opposed to family carer. This was one of the many issues we discussed with Martin Rogan, CEO, Mental Health Ireland, and his colleague Catherine Brogan, when we met together at their head-quarters in April. One specific outcome of the meeting is that we have agreed to look at working together on a possible new discussion paper for publication in the future. Martin reports that Mental Health Ireland is committed to co- production which actively involves people with personal experience of mental health issues, family members and health professionals in the design, delivery and evaluation of mental health services.

Social Policy Network Meeting

On Tuesday 17th April, Care Alliance Ireland was delighted to welcome members of the Social Policy Network to the Carmichael Centre for their quarterly meeting. The group meets to share information and ideas on the respective work of the member organisations in relation to social policy, and to act as a support and learning network for those doing social policy work. The group has a rotating Chair, and members take turns hosting meetings in their respective locations. The April meeting welcomed Laura Ronney Ferris, Systems Librarian at Dr. Steevens Library, HSE, to discuss how Open Access publishing can be used for social policy purposes.

Work undertaken on research and policy issues recently includes:

 - Consultation on Proposed Guiding Principles to Frame the State's Economic Migration Policy
 - Advance Healthcare Directives Codes of Practice Consultation
- Actively involved in the Public Patient Involvement (PPI) project with the University of Limerick
- Continued support and collaboration with University College Dublin on Family Carers and Dementia (HRB-funded project)
- Continued facilitation of the Family Carer Research Group. Most recent group meeting took place March 2018
- Continuing to meet with a number of member organisations, in particular following on from the engagement drive in Q1.
- Developing material re: Care Alliance Pre-Budget priorities to share with member organisations to get feedback for Budget 2019
- Ongoing drafting of further papers in the Discussion Paper Series. As always, Zoe
 welcomes any feedback on the papers in this series, and suggestions for upcoming topics to
 be addressed.
- Support of student projects on the topic of family care where appropriate.
- Continued availability to member organisations to consult and support on key policy & research issues.

Empowering Professionals to support Young Carers – Project Update

The work of EPYC is ongoing, with the final partner face-to-face meeting having taken place in Edinburgh in March. At the meeting we discussed our outputs to date, how to frame our final guidance report, and how we might be able to build on the work of the group into the future. The final guidance report, which is being delivered by Carers Trust in Scotland with support from Care Alliance Ireland, will reflect the experiences of the EPYC project and highlight the work done by the partners. We anticipate the report will be a useful guide for organisations new to working with young carers, and will demonstrate the challenges and successes of the partners through the EPYC experience.

The meeting in Edinburgh was timed to coincide with a young carer showcase event being hosted by our Scottish partners, Carers Trust. This event brought together young carer support organisations to discuss the work they are doing and how they are building and developing their services. The showcase was an excellent opportunity to learn from our contemporaries in a jurisdiction with significant knowledge of and investment in family carers and young carers.

The EPYC project will be highlighted during National Carers Week with a seminar on young carers taking place in the Carmichael Centre, Dublin 7 on Tuesday morning 12 June. Book here.

A Change in Judging Criteria for 2018 Good Governance Awards





The Good Governance Awards (GGA) is an initiative that recognises and encourages adherence to good governance practice by Nonprofit organisations in Ireland.

The Awards were developed in 2016 by Carmichael and are supported by the Charities Institute Ireland, Boardmatch, Dóchas, Enclude, Volunteer Ireland, The Wheel, together with our corporate partners; Davy, Governance-Online, Mason Hayes & Curran and Mazars Ireland.

Annual Reports

The Good Governance Award seek to acknowledge, encourage and promote good governance practice primarily in the area of annual reports.

A New Governance Award in 2018 - Best Governance Improvement Initiative

This new award will recognise initiatives that have been taken in the last 12-18 months to improve the quality of the nonprofit's governance. Nonprofits can submit their good governance initiatives, setting out (briefly – max 750 words) the governance issue(s) they addressed, the actions they took and the impact that this has had for the organisation.

Entry Criteria

- To enter, the organisation must be an Irish nonprofit organisation (i.e. it has a registered office in the Republic of Ireland).
- There are 2 award types and 5 entry categories based on the income size of the
 organisation from those with an annual income of under €250k to those with an
 annual income of over €15m. Organisations may enter for either award type or
 for both.
- A nonprofit organisation must upload their entry to the GGA website by the closing date (14th Sept, 2018).
- Shortlisted listed organisations may be asked to supply additional information to assist the judges in their adjudications.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland Launches Regional Group for Dementia Carers Advocacy Network in Munster

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland (ASI) has launched the regional group of its carer advocacy network, the Dementia Carers Campaign Network (DCCN), in Munster and the first meeting of the Southern DCCN took place at the Clayton Hotel in Limerick back in March.

The DCCN, which was set up in 2013, is a national campaigning group and is made up of people who have experience of caring for a loved one with dementia. This group is open to anyone who is interested in advocacy and has experience caring for a friend or family member with dementia.

The DCCN aims to be a voice of and for dementia carers in Ireland and to raise awareness of issues affecting families living with dementia. The group is supported and facilitated by the ASI. Since the DCCN's inception, members of the network have been involved in monitoring the implementation of Ireland's first National Dementia Strategy (NDS); taken part in awareness-raising activities, including national and local media work; contributed to research programmes; and spoken at conferences and events across Ireland.

There are 500,000 people across Ireland whose families have been affected by dementia. In order to adequately reflect the experiences of dementia carers in Munster, the ASI has established the Southern DCCN, which will focus on highlighting the issues affecting dementia carers in the region. DCCN committee member from Cork Ann Twomey said: "Since working with the Dementia Carers Campaign Network (DCCN) I have used my own experiences as a carer for my late husband to the benefit of other carers – by raising awareness of issues facing families caring for a loved one with dementia and by lobbying for policy change. Being a part of the Dementia Carers Campaign Network gives you a voice that may otherwise have gone unheard."

CRC – Central Remedial Clinic

The CRC is one of the largest national disability organisations, working with approximately 4,000 children and adults with disabilities in Ireland. We employ over 300 highly talented and



committed people and we are supported by over 100 passionate and enthusiastic volunteers. Our mission is to work together to make a positive difference to the lives of people with disabilities, their families and carers.

We provide multidisciplinary assessment and treatment services to children from the greater Dublin area. We also provide specialist services to children with physical disabilities who access our specialist service from every county in Ireland and provide a range of specialist medical, therapeutic and assistive technology services to children and adults with complex disabilities and rare conditions. With innovative medical and surgical interventions, evidence-based therapies and assistive technologies, children and adults with disability are supported to achieve their maximum potential.

Our adult services are located in Dublin and we operate them from five different centres. We are committed to supporting young people and adults with disabilities to have a life with opportunities to develop new skills, realise their potential, achieve academically, advocate for disability rights, build relationships and participate in their local communities and in wider society, through valued social roles.

We are also Trustees for two special schools in Clontarf and Clondalkin for over 150 children with physical and other complex disabilities. The CRC Schools provide differentiated and individualised education to pupils with physical and multiple disabilities. Pupils also access health and social services and other essential services, mainly during the school day. All pupils have multiple disabilities but a primary physical disability, in line with our official school designation.

We have an ambitious strategic plan that is focused on continuous improvement and growth of services in line with national policy. Every day, in every service we aim to realise our vision of people with disabilities achieving their potential and living full lives as equal and valued citizens.

Governance Corner New Strategic Plan on the Cards

Our current Strategic Plan (2014–2017) has come to an end. At the March 2018 board meeting, the Chair, the Executive Director and three other board members were directed to begin the process of



developing a new strategic plan. The first step has been to undertake a review of the existing plan. The review found that the plan was implemented to a large degree and that the organisation is well positioned to build on its achievements in the context of a highly functioning and moderately resourced organisation. A strong staff and director team, deeper and more engaged membership base, and exemplary governance, together with strong collaborative relationships that have been built up across the statutory, not-for-profit and academic sectors, augur well for the development of a new and impactful Strategic Plan. Over the coming months, many of our stakeholders will be invited to feed into this process by way of phone conversations and surveys.

Policies Under Review

At the May board meeting, the board considered a new Company Governance Handbook. The handbook incorporates most of the organisation's policies and proceedures, and is a useful resource to support director and staff induction. Research

New Carer-Related Research and Evidence Exchange Network (CAREN)

Speaking on the recent launch of a repository of significant family carer research, Dr. Mary Larkin, the lead researcher behind this project, said:

"this freely accessible resource seeks to meet the needs of ALL those across the globe who require any form of carer-related knowledge – be this research evidence, and/or information about practice and policy. It is for national and international use by governments, carers, employers, policy makers, practitioners, researchers, NGOs/third sector organisations and research funders. Not only does CAREN provide a reliable, regularly updated, independent, searchable and coherently organised database of information and evidence about carers, it also allows those accessing it to communicate and exchange knowledge".

The resources within this network are organised into 62 themes, which are listed under the four major categories (see below). Clicking on a theme will take you to a list of all resources within that theme. You can click on an author's name to find further resources by that author, and use other links to access the original source material.

In addition, clicking on the title of any individual resource shows details about the source of the information, such as the type of reference, ISBN/ISSN, publication year, keywords. A number of these fields can then be used to find further resources, i.e. with the same keywords, or by the same author using the links on the right-hand side and within the Key Information box.

Carer variables

The characteristics and features of different types of carer and caring situations.

Impact of care

The consequences and sequela of caring.

Support and carers

The provision and impact of general and specific help and support.

Type of care

The nature of needs of the cared-for person, and the features of the care situation.

The event is taking place in Modena on the 5–6

June. We are delighted that a wonderful advocate for family carers and a former family carer herself, Annie McGuinness, will be taking part in the Study Visit.

Associative discrimination comes about when someone is treated unfavourably on the basis of another person's protected characteristic. In relation to carers, it is probably best understood where a disadvantage can be expressed in the following simple statement: 'but for my relationship with a dependent person, this would not have happened.' For example, a candidate who has been told she is getting a job is suddenly deselected after revealing that she has a severely disabled child with complicated care arrangements. The withdrawal of the job offer could amount to discrimination based on her association with a disabled person (disability being a protected characteristic).

This Study Visit will benefit from the expertise of external guests, including Professor Luke Clements (from the School of Law at the University of Leeds), representatives from the School of Law at the University of Modena, colleagues from the Regional Carers Association in Italy (who will share their experience about the development of the regional and national law on carers). The Study Visits provide an opportunity for Eurocarers members to learn from each other, take stock of the network's knowledge and good practices and lay the ground for future common initiatives at policy and/or practice level. As always, participants will therefore be expected to actively contribute to the discussion by presenting either their organisation's work and/or views on the topic or the legal environment for work in their country/region.
