Background

For several years, agencies working with Family Carers in Ireland have articulated their concern about the unmet needs of young carers. The recently published National Carers Strategy identifies Young Carers as a key area for intervention.

"Young carers are children and young persons under 18 who provide, or intend to provide, care, assistance or support to another family member. They carry out, often on a regular basis, significant or substantial caring tasks and assume a level of responsibility which would usually be associated with an adult." (Becker)

Internationally, there is considerable evidence documenting the issues faced by these young carers. When a young person provides long term high levels of care to a family member there can often be negative impacts on the young person's welfare. These can include negative educational, social and emotional impacts. Not all impacts are negative and sharing some level of care with one's family can bring positive benefits to the young person. There is little provision of specific young carer supports in Ireland, but there are a number of local initiatives with promising results. At an interagency meeting in February 2011 a number of agencies with an interest in young carers came together to find out what is going on around the country for young carers and to share their ideas. We committed to organising a follow up seminar to facilitate the further development of this evolving area. Since 2011 the first ever Outreach Officer for Young Carers has been appointed. In addition, Irish Census data is helping us quantify the number of young carers reported. New research and practice initiatives and interventions have also been developed.

Speaker Biographies

Amanda Norris – is 19 years old and was the joint recipient with her brother Sam, of the Young Carer of the Year Award 2012. Born in Limerick City, Amanda and her family are now living in Finglas and she supports her mother in caring for her two siblings with special needs aged 6 & 15 years. Amanda is studying Health & Community Services in All Hallows College, Dublin.

Dr Geoffrey Shannon is a solicitor and Special Rapporteur for Child Protection. He is the Chairman of the Adoption Authority of Ireland and the author of *Child Law*, a major new work of over 1,400 pages on the law relating to children. This book has been described by the Chief Justice as "an exceptional work" and the Irish Law Times as "an outstandingly erudite tome in an area of law of increasing complexity written by an author who has an encyclopaedic knowledge unsurpassed in this area of law". Geoffrey has been selected by the European Expert Organising Committee as the Irish expert member of the *Commission on European Family Law*. In 2010, he was appointed by the Minister for Children along with Norah Gibbons to conduct a review of 196 children who have died in the care of the state in the last ten years. The review was published in June 2012 and has been described as a watershed in the area of child protection in Ireland. Geoffrey is the recipient of the Canon Maurice Handy Award for the period January 2006 to December 2007. He is also the recipient of an Award by the Chamber of Commerce for Outstanding Contribution to Children. Last year he was presented with the FLAC Contribution to Public Interest Law Award which is made to a person who in the opinion of FLAC has made a significant contribution to the area of public interest law.

Gary Rutherford – was appointed by The Carers Association as Young Carers Outreach & Development Coordinator earlier this year. Gary works with Lee Anne Greville as part of their Young Carers Project team working to research and develop identification and referral pathways for our young people with caring responsibilities; provide an Information and Awareness programme in schools; and develop a programme of supports that responds to the spectrum of needs which young carers identify. He holds a BA (Hons) in Social Care and has a background in community development and disability services.

Lee Anne Greville has worked with The Carers Association since early 2009 on various projects such as lobbying and advocacy campaigns; The Carers Association Membership Programme; The Carers of the Year Awards; various events; online communications; and has recently put together Ireland's first dedicated website for young Carers. Lee Anne herself was a young Carer starting her caring role at the age of 12.

Mandy Bell has worked in the development of young carers services since 1997 and is currently on the Leadership Team at Gloucestershire Young Carers. Her experience includes improving support to young carers through the development of a whole family approach supported by partnerships with health, education, social care and youth support services and her current projects include the development of services for young substance misuse carers. She has a particular expertise in the impact of parental mental ill health on dependent children and in 2010 she was awarded a Winston Churchill Travel Fellowship to undertake a fact finding trip to Australia to learn from their experience of supporting these families. Gloucestershire Young Carers is an independent charity supporting young carers from 6 – 25 years of age.
